

An extract from the History Archives... "Electrophants" at Follyfaunts in Goldhanger

In the mid 1960s electrically driven mechanical elephants called Electrophants were developed and marketed from Follyfaunts House. Here is an extract from a 1968 USA magazine called "Road and Track"...

ELECTROPHANT

Six years have been spent in the development of the Electrophant and we understand that Electrophants, Ltd. have now set up a production line at the factory located at Folly Faunts House, Goldhanger, Maldon, Essex, England. ... Shrouded in secrecy these past six years, no one is quite sure of the names of the key figures behind this remarkable breakthrough in the field of transportation but it is suspected that the Colin Chapman of the Electrophant is a certain Lord Hillingdon, mainly because his name appears on the letterhead When you want one, you simply call Lord Hillingdon at Folly Faunts House (Goldhanger 213) and presumably his lordship will be pleased to fill your order.



The Lord Hillingdon referred to above was probably Charles Hedworth Mills (1922-1978) the 4th baron, who is buried in Feering churchyard. The Colin Chapman mentioned may have been the well known founder of Lotus Cars.

The original developments of a full and half size machine using petrol engines was in the late 1940s and early 50s at Thaxted. They were used to give rides to children at holiday resorts around the UK during the summers of the 1950s and 60s, including at Maldon. However they suffered from the drawback that the exhaust fumes emitted from the elephants trunk caused the children to choke!

A later version developed at Follyfaunts used several standard 12-volt car batteries as the means of power. This overcame the problem of fumes and had the advantage that they could operate indoors and were used for children's rides in departmental stores. Only a few of this version seem to have been built before the company went bankrupt, probably the result of an incident in the USA when one fell over. It probably toppled due to the weight of the batteries in the body combined with the weight of the children being carried on top.

Electrophants were shipped worldwide to the USA, Australia and Sweden, and there are videos on YouTube showing them in use in those places, the most recent is dated 2014. They also appeared in many television programmes such as Blue Peter in 1967 and in 1975, the ITV programme 'The Way We Were' in 2006 and in the BBC Top Gear programme in 2008. In 2011 one was auctioned on the Channel-4 programme "Four Rooms".

GOLDHANGER PARISH COUNCIL Report on the Meeting held on 12th January 2015

Repair work to the rear access road at Hall Estate has now been completed.

Wilkin and Sons has generously agreed to sponsor new parking restrictions in Fish Street, and the Parish Council will now investigate ways of enforcing these restrictions.

A work party will be held in Marigold Wood in April or May of this year. Details will be published in the magazine at a later date.

Councillors approved the draft budget for the year to 31.3.2017, and the precept has been set at £7,800. Issues in the budget include: repair work in the play area, provision for parking enforcement in Fish Street, and improvement of the access to Marigold Wood.

Two very generous donations have been received from the Blackwater Show and the Goldhanger Classic Car Club towards the cost of purchasing a defibrillator for the village. The Parish Council is also investigating sources of grant funding for this.

Following the recent inspection, some repair work has been carried out in the play area in the playing field. Further work will be done shortly, and any offers of help to paint the play equipment will be gratefully received.

Recently there was an incident of hare coursing in fields adjacent to Blind Lane, and a vehicle was set on fire and abandoned.

Planning

Maldon District Council has approved an application for various tree works at Churchside, Church Street (TCA/MAL/15/01151).

New application ESS/MAL/ 15/01317. Proposed washing plant for use during the construction of an agricultural reservoir, previously approved under planning ref: ESS/35/14/MAL – Cobbs Farm Maldon Road Goldhanger. The Parish Council has no objections in principle to this application, but feels that the washing plant should not be in use beyond May 2017, and that restrictions should be placed on the amount of noise from the site. It also raised concerns that existing conditions are not being adhered to with regards to the cleaning of vehicle wheels, unsheeted vehicles leaving the site and reversing bleepers being clearly audible.

Gardeners Farm Maldon Road: two Appeals have now been made to the Planning Inspectorate concerning this site. FUL/MAL/14/00753 change of use of former farm shop to dog grooming parlour, and LDE/MAL/15/00682 Claim for Certificate of Lawfulness: existing self contained dwelling.

Maldon District Council's planning enforcement officer is investigating issues at the building site on the corner of Maldon Road and Church Street. The Parish Council has raised concerns about the removal of hedges and drainage at the site.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on 9th February 2016 at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall. Members of the public and press are welcome to attend and the agenda will be published on the Parish Council web site prior to the meeting. Minutes of meetings can also be found on the web site.



Recipe of the month

Something for pancake day or to impress a loved one for breakfast on Valentine's Day.

Dairy and egg-free banana pancakes

- 1 banana
- 1 tbsp sunflower oil, plus extra to oil the pan
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 100g (3 1/2oz) plain flour
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 400ml (13 1/2fl oz) soya milk
- maple syrup, to serve



Mash the banana with a fork and whisk in the oil, lemon juice and cinnamon. Add the flour and baking powder. Stir while gradually adding the soya milk. The batter will take on the consistency of yogurt.

Place a frying pan on a medium heat. Oil it using a little sunflower oil on a scrunched piece of kitchen towel. Drop tablespoonfuls of batter onto the pan and swirl so it spreads across the surface. When bubbles pop and the glossiness of the pancake becomes matte (about two minutes), flip over. Cook for a further couple of minutes.

Place the finished pancakes on a plate. Repeat the process until the batter is used up. Serve hot with maple syrup.

BELLS AT St. PETERS CHURCH GOLDHANGER



'HOW BORING' was the reaction from my family when I said I had been asked to write notes on the maintenance of the Church Bells. Well, if you've read this far that's a good start.

The picture shows four of the bells in our Bell Tower. In all, there are eight bells on this frame, which makes the area very congested and very dynamic when all eight are ringing. The bells weigh up to half a ton each, so you can imagine a lot of vibration forces when all are being rung enthusiastically.

This presents the first major maintenance problem. That of fatigue of the steelwork, their fixings (nuts and bolts) and indeed the tower brickwork itself. All these have to be checked regularly for any fatigue fractures, loose nuts and crumbling structures. The photo shows extensive brickwork repairs in the corner. Indeed, three local towers have had to stop ringing recently for tower repairs. St Mary's and All Saints in Maldon, and St Mary's Tollesbury.

The bells are shown in the UP position, that is with the open mouth facing up. They are held there by a wooden Stay. The bell rope is attached to the large wheel that rotates the bell. When pulled firmly, the bell rotates down and round 360 degrees back to the UP position where again it can be held by the Stay. The skill of the bell ringer prevents the Stays being hit too hard, but we've all broken Stays at some time during our learning! Maintenance ensures a ready stock of Stays for speedy replacement.


When the bells are in the UP position it is extremely dangerous as they are unstable and could easily cause serious injury. The bells are almost always left in the DOWN position for safety. Before we start ringing we have to get the bells UP. This involves pulling the ropes to get the bells swinging more and more until they reach the UP position. Hence you will often hear a rather ragged bit of ringing before proper ringing starts.

Health and Safety is a top priority in the bell tower. This is the first consideration with all maintenance work and also with the training and conduct of all ringers, especially learners. So any newcomers are welcome to come in the confidence they will be handling well maintained and safe equipment to enjoy the pleasure and challenge of Bell Ringing.

The Vicar/Rector Writes:

Last Year, This Year.

The early days and weeks of the New Year invariably involve some reflection on last year, and looking forward to what the coming one holds for us. What will you remember 2015 for? A holiday or a family joy or sorrow perhaps. The beginning of the massive migration of refugees may also come to mind, as may ISIS and other terrorist activities. Once again, flooding has affected parts of the UK. What do we have to look forward to this year? Here again, family holidays may well be at the top of the list. As a nation, we have the Queen's 90th birthday. (Why are so many of us coy about our age, while the whole World knows how old the Queen is?!). What will the economy and work situation continue to bring, for individuals, for families, for nations and for the western world?

Last year, yet another old friend of ours died of cancer. Following a battle with it which lasted for some years, it finally went to her lungs. I particularly remember her as a member of a party who scaled the three highest peaks in the British Isles with me during one amazing week of my sabbatical, ten years ago now. Can faith in God encompass all of our human experiences, in their entirety? I believe it can, but not in any simplistic way. I hope that the following thoughts are at least pointers in the right direction.

- I don't ever try to stop people being angry with God, if they need or want to be. You can't be angry with someone who doesn't exist, after all! He's big enough to deal with it himself, and doesn't need me to stand up for Him. I have felt anger with God myself in times of personal suffering, and such feelings normally burn themselves out in due course. In any case, isn't the crucifixion of Christ about God taking responsibility for the anger and suffering of the world, and taking it all upon himself? I believe this to be one of the many elements of what the cross of Christ is all about.
- The human element of blameworthiness must surely also be considered. Inadequately built homes in places that are liable to flood or earthquake damage, for example. In the developing world, it's the poorest people who are likely to be living in places that are most vulnerable to disaster, but this doesn't necessarily carry over into the western world. In his Christmas address of a few years ago, the then Archbishop of Canterbury drew attention again to the world of high finance and those at the other end of the scale who pay the ultimate price for their speculation.
- The hand of God is surly to be seen in the response to suffering. Jesus himself said "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted." Many people in need feel that comfort is mediated to them by means of a human agency, a loved one, a friend or a complete stranger. The appeal launched by Stephen our Diocesan Bishop, to welcome and resettle Syrian Refugees in East London and Essex, closed at the end of the 2015 having reached nearly £100,000. The first refugees are expected to arrive immanently, and updates made on how the money is being spent.

- There are also the 'Miracles', the rays of light shining in the darkness. Many of us will know someone who is in long-term remission from cancer, as that is thankfully becoming more commonplace today. There are those who are found alive and well days after a disaster, when hope for them had faded. I guess many of us will have news-footage pictures in our minds of people, especially children perhaps, being pulled out from a pile of rubble several days after the disaster has taken place.

We wish each other a "Happy New Year," and mean it sincerely, while at the same time we recognize that it probably won't all be good. When the good times do come in 2016, let's remember to thank God for them, and share them with him. Some of us are very good at telling him about our bad times, after all! It's been said that while we are in this life it's like looking at the back of a tapestry: something of the great design can be made out in the coloured thread, but it can be vague, indistinct and has many faults. We can only hope to see the proper picture, the front of the tapestry if you like, when we are in the nearer presence of the Lord in the life to come. In the meantime, though, we can be working on straightening those threads as it were, trying to make things as good as we can for others as well as ourselves, in 2016.





Wildwatching News

I should probably take a break from trying to predict the weather – I thought it was going to be a cold winter this year. I may yet be proved right, of course (huh!). At the time of writing, New Year week, it's a bit more like the seasonal average, following an exceptionally mild December. Some Daisies have been out, and Pussy Willow buds breaking.

Some Fieldfares have made the North Sea crossing from Scandinavia, despite mild weather in western Europe generally. A very alert-looking Mistle Thrush on the top of a bush near to Great Totham church was evidence of their presence – Fieldfares tend to use mob tactics to feed on berries that are being jealously guarded by resident Blackbirds and Thrushes. The Fieldfare's deep, throaty chuckling calls as they fly around in groups epitomises farmland in winter. What was a bit more unexpected was the Smooth Newt taking refuge in a corner of Honywood Hall just before Christmas, to the delight of the Totham School KS2 Choir who were entertaining at the Lunch Club.

A birdwatching session on Boxing Day produced wintering ducks at Abberton, including Goldeneye and Goosander, from the Layer Breton Causeway, and six species of wader at the Strood included a female Curlew. If the down-curved Curlew's bill is just large, it probably indicates a male bird. If it's enormous, it's a female! The distant sound of Brent Geese at the Strood epitomises the estuary in winter – and a fly-past by a male Marsh Harrier as dusk approached completed the day.

Mammals have been well represented in the area of late, with a Hare picked up in car headlights being my first for a year or two. A Badger has been seen pre-dawn one day at Wickham Bishops. Muntjack Deer tend not to be seen in daylight hours in places where people like me walk their dogs, but their tracks in wet mud indicate they are present. In the countryside around Roxwell, where I have a "Bolt hole," this extends to include the much larger tracks of Fallow Deer as well.



"Commuting" between Great Totham, Little Totham and Goldhanger has produced several Barn Owl sightings recently, along with Buzzards which can often be seen at some point. One morning, a Red Kite was quartering fields, looking for prey, and on another occasion, a Snipe, (Pictured) was flushed up out of a roadside ditch. They are probably more common around here in winter than is immediately obvious. The Snipe is a tiny wader,

with a distinctive erratic, zig-zag flight when flushed.

Whether or not we get some icy, arctic weather this month, it should bring some of the best of winter wildlife watching...




