

An extract from the History Archives...



Thirty cottages were demolished in the village in the 1950s. They were tied and tenanted properties in a bad state of repair and were owned by absent landlords, some of whom were descendants of past Lords of the Manor and Rectors. They had been condemned by Maldon Rural District Council as unfit for habitation.

As early as 1938 newspaper articles were reporting that the council had identified 23 cottages in the village that needed to be demolished, but a temporary reprieve was granted in response to opposition and WW-2 deferred action for a further 15 years. It made the newspapers at the time, here are some extracts...

Maldon & Burnham Standard in 1938

A Reprieve For "Street Smugglers"

COLDHANGER, Essex, Thursday. PEOPLE of this tiny Essex village, nestling on one of the numerous creeks in the Essex coast, are breathing more freely to-day following the visit of members of the Maldon Rural District

One of its officers had recommended that some 23 houses in the villagepractically a whole street-should be demolished, but the visit of the Council resulted in a "reprieve" for most of the houses.

SAVE ENGLAND!

IS there a secret band of beauty "assassins" who go about the country condemning old cottages on sight?

Suddenly a charming village, like that of Goldhanger, is doomed. In the interests pre-sumably of public health. Cottages obsolete, insanitary. Away with them!

Then an outcry from locals and the oldest inhabitant who has survived till ninety-five in the horrible "slum."

Preserve them! Cottages beautiful, very

durable, can be repaired.

There is an official type who seems to regard everything over a hundred years old as ripe for abolition.

THREATENED COTTAGES AT GOLDHANGER

MALDON, ESSEX

If the Maldon rural district council acts on the recommendation of one of its inspectors, about a quarter of the attractive village of Goldhanger, on the estuary of the River Blackwater, will be pulled down.

In a report considered by the council at its meeting last week the inspector marked 23 small dwellings for destruction under a clearance order. opinion," he wrote, "these houses cannot be brought up to modern requirements without spending a large sum of money

Although the cottages were picturesque by today's standards, they were described by those who had lived in them as: damp, cold, tiny with very low ceilings and little or no sanitation. Most were poorly constructed of softwood with "lath & plaster" walls. Some were built with soft porous red bricks with no cavities or damp courses.

Those who were renting the condemned properties at the time were offered new council houses on Maldon Road which were a huge improvement in living standards, providing dry, warm spacious accommodation with running water and "all mod-cons". The lands occupied by the demolished properties were sold in the early 1960s and the owner-occupier houses and bungalows we see today were built, which was seen by some as a form of social engineering.

Fortunately, the cottages lost can still be seen on old postcards. This month's cover picture is of cottages in Church St. The cover pictures of February and October parish magazines last year showed other cottages lost.



coppiced tree may live for 60 or so years, but a coppiced tree may survive for 500!


Male and female flowers are found on the same tree. The yellow male catkins open in early spring - sometimes known as "lambs tails".



GOLDHANGER PARISH COUNCIL

Report on the Annual Meeting held on 10th May 2016

Julia Bourn was elected as Chair of the Council for 2016-2017, with Hugh Reynolds as Vice Chair. The Council expressed its gratitude to Mike Sargeant for all his hard work as Chair over the last nineteen years.

<u>Defibrillator:</u> The application form for a grant for the purchase of a defibrillator has now been completed and will be sent in.

Planning

The following decisions by Maldon District Council were noted:

16 Fish Street – Remove lilac tree – allowed to proceed.

Hall Farm – construction of a boundary wall between Hall Farm and the adjoining development site – approved.

The Old Rectory Church Street – erection of stables and grazing of land by horses – approved with conditions regarding no burning of waste or floodlighting on the site, and no commercial use.

The new format for responses to Maldon District Council planning applications was noted. Councillors considered the following new application:

Erection of four five bedroom dwellings to the rear of the Jenny Moody site at the junction of Maldon Road and Church Street. It was resolved to object to this application on the grounds that the site lies outside the village development boundary and is not considered sustainable. The proposed soakaway for drainage is not adequate and would lead to drainage problems, and there is insufficient detail on the application regarding design and materials. A proposed balcony on one of the dwellings would lead to overlooking of neighbouring gardens.

<u>The internal audit</u> has now been completed, and the Council addressed the points raised in the report. The accounts for the year ended 31.3.2016 were approved and will now be sent for external audit.

<u>Play area.</u> Councillor Mr Sargeant was thanked for his work in carrying out repairs to the equipment in the play area.

Highways.

Flooding and blocked drains in parts of Church Street will be reported to the County Council. The Local Highways Panel will be asked to provide a progress report on the 20mph speed limit in Fish Street. At present there is some difficulty in finding room on the highway for the speed limit signs.

Yellow parking lines in Fish Street have been approved and funding secured, but as yet there is no date for completion.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Tuesday 14th June at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall. Members of the public and the press are welcome to attend.

BELLRINGING NEWS

A busy time for the Goldhanger bell ringers!



The Goldhanger bell ringers have been very busy in the last few months.

Three ringers attended the Essex Ringing Course in April, and as you will know from the last magazine our Tower Captain Andrew Kelso was also one of the tutors. Three days of intensive ringing tuition in different ability groups and different towers across the county left us all tired but with a sense that our ringing skills had greatly improved.

The Essex Association of Bell Ringers holds regular practice evenings throughout the district, and during the winter and spring some of our ringers have been to other towers for a chance to practice on different bells and with different bands. In Goldhanger we are lucky to have an easy set of bells, but in other towers the bells can be more challenging and it is all good experience to go and ring elsewhere. A district practice will be held at Goldhanger on 15th June, where ringers from elsewhere are invited to join us for an evening of varied ringing. A visiting band is also coming to Goldhanger on 26th June.

Along with many other towers in the country, we celebrated St George's Day with a session of rounds and call changes by the local band, and then a successful quarter peal which included some ringers from other bands. A quarter peal involves some forty five minutes of continuous ringing of methods or tunes, and requires a great deal of stamina and concentration. If it goes wrong and a mistake is made, even at the very last minute, the quarter peal is deemed unsuccessful. So well done to this ringing team on completing the quarter peal.

The Goldhanger ringers are heading off on their tour into Suffolk on 4th June, beginning at Orford and ending up in Ipswich, a total in all of six churches. It's always an enjoyable day, again giving a chance for us to ring on a variety of bells, and a sociable pub lunch makes the day go even better! A full report of this tour will be included in the magazine's June edition.

On 12th June the ringers will celebrate the Queen's official birthday with a special ring where it is planned to "fire" the bells ninety times, one for each year of the Queen's life. Firing is when all the bells ring together, so instead of ringing one after the other the bells all come down together. It's not easy (especially ninety times) but it should sound quite dramatic!

Last but not least the Goldhanger ringers will be heading off to Great Totham on 14th May for a striking competition. One team (all Goldhanger) will ring call changes, where the bells are constantly moved into different positions, and another team of Goldhanger and other ringers will ring a tune or method. The judges will listen carefully to see that the bells are rung evenly and in a good rhythm, with points being lost if the bells are irregular or rung too close or too far apart. It should be an enjoyable afternoon.

As part of the celebrations for the Queen's Official Birthday the bellringers will be ringing the bells on Sunday 12 June. As she's 90 we thought it would be fitting to fire (ring all the bells at exactly the same time) the bells 90 times. In between we plan to ring the bells in a sequence known as Queens. We'll be ringing at midday so do have a listen out and feel free to count!'

Recipe of the month


Spaghetti with Lemon and Toasted Walnuts


Serves 8

30 minutes or fewer

This simple combination is tasty on its own, or it can be filled out with roasted or steamed vegetables.

- 1 cup walnut halves
- ½ cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- ¼ cup olive oil
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- 2 tsp. grated organic lemon zest
- 1 clove garlic, minced (1 tsp.)
- ¾ tsp. freshly ground black pepper
- 1 lb. spaghetti
- 1 cup Italian parsley, coarsely chopped





3. Cook pasta according to package directions. Drain, and reserve 1/2 cup pasta cooking water. Add drained pasta to cheese mixture, and toss to combine, adding some pasta water if mixture seems too thick. Stir in parsley and walnuts, and season with salt and more pepper, if desired.

Wildwatching News

We're into the peak time for Cuckoo activity at the time of writing - the second week in May. Individuals have been heard from Goldhanger Creek through to Bog Grove in Great Totham, including during hours of darkness. Try listening at an open window in the quiet of night, when even a very distant one may be audible. It's difficult to know how many Cuckoos are present in this area, but I've heard at least two at the same time at Chigborough. It's only the males that "Cuckoo" - the females make a peculiar gargling sound, which is worth listening out for if you get close to one.

Up to five Nightingales can be heard singing just outside the gate to the Visitors Centre at Abberton Reservoir, but Fingringhoe Wick nature reserve continues to be the best local hotspot for them. Common Terns can be seen and heard wherever there is a significant body of fresh water in the area. I've heard just one singing Turtle Dove so far, in the vicinity of Bog Grove and Mill Field in Great Totham. Hopefully as the season progresses, more representatives of this critically endangered species will be heard and seen around here. Their far-carrying and yet soft and purring song epitomises spring, at least in the more coastal parts of Essex.



Warblers have returned and are singing, with Chiffchaffs and Blackcaps seeming to be the most numerous. The Chiffchaffs slightly brighter cousin, the Willow Warbler, (Pictured), is suffering declining numbers at present. I've heard just two this year so far, one on an organised dawn chorus walk at Roxwell,

and one at Chigborough. Whitethroats and Lesser Whitethroats can be heard singing in hedgerows. The Lesser Whitethroats song is a monotonous "Rattle rattle rattle," which for me brings back childhood memories of the sound made by my Grandma's old treadle sewing machine!

Muntjacks continue to be spotted in spite of their secretive ways - and it will be worth a "Pilgrimage" to Mersea Island sometime this summer to try to see one or two Red Squirrels. A total of 29 animals have been released from three different sites. They are now breeding successfully in the wild, and are being seen all over the island. I suspect that Cudmore Grove country park, and wooded areas on the eastern end of the island are most likely to bring results. It's also very good for Sand Martins, (and Adders!) here. The Sand Martins make nesting tunnels in the soft, muddy cliffs, and hawk insects over the clifftops.

The Vicar / Rector writes:

"The people who live in darkness will see a great light. On those who live in the dark land of death the light will shine." Matthew 4 v l6."

This month brings the longest days of the year -about seventeen hours of glorious sunshine, we hope. It also brings the shortest nights. Our pagan ancestors celebrated this victory of light over darkness by lighting fires in a symbolic attempt to control and retain the heat and light of Midsummer.

The Judeo Christian tradition also sees light in very positive terms, but at the expense of giving darkness a hard time of it. There are dozens of references to darkness in the Bible, mostly portraying it in a negative sort of way, as with the verse from Matthew's Gospel above. There are many other scriptural examples to chose from, Including in the first book of Samuel where the wicked "Disappear in darkness." Also, Job speaks of the day he was born in terms of "Gloom and thick darkness, and in Ecclesiastes we can read that "the fool walks in darkness..."

Add to that our childhood fear of the dark: Those strange shadows on the bedroom wall, the creeks and noises that houses make in the quiet after dark, and the imaginary terrors and "Spooks" lurking in dark corners ... Many adults prefer the light summer evenings to the dark winter ones, although personally I try to make the most of all times of the year. It's very understandable, though, when people say, for example following the death of their spouse, that they dread the long winter evenings when they will be on their own.

Africa used to be regarded as "The dark continent" in Victorian times. In other words, it was perceived as a continent of "Primitive savages" who were lost in the grip of pagan belief and witchcraft. The perception continued that Africa was in desperate need of civilisation, and of those brave Christian missionaries who would risk their lives by taking the Light of Christ into the darkness. Although I rejoice in the light of Christ being taken to Africa and to all parts of the world, I think it's recognised today that in some ways indigenous peoples are more advanced than we are. I've written before about being privileged to have attended the annual Semiahmoo tribe Salmon Festival in British Columbia. The Mayor of White Rock spoke at the festival of the admiration he felt for his First Nation friends, and especially for all that they have to teach us about living in harmony with the environment.

Darkness can be wonderful, both in the midsummer, and all the year round. This time of year we appreciate the wonders of life and growth all around us: The leaves and blossom in our gardens, and even the growing grass which has to be mowed, and the growing crops in the fields. This is only possible because of all the activity going on in the cool and darkness beneath the ground, though, as roots suck up water and nutrients.

For the unborn child, the warmth, safety, security and darkness of the womb makes it a wonderful first home. When my children and their cousins were in their teens, "Commandoes" was a game that could only be played after dark. The object was to get through undergrowth or long grass to a base, without being seen by the person who was

"On" at the time, who used a torch to try to spot people trying to get to the base. Perhaps you have seen wildlife films on T.V. in which a female bear hibernates in the (Comparative) warmth of a snowdrift, from which she emerges in the spring with one or two cubs, born in the darkness of the den. Wonderful things can happen in the dark!

May we enjoy and celebrate the long days of this month, but also the short summer nights, which can be lovely and something to thank God for. The darkness is warm and friendly, and an invitation to sleep and refreshment after the long day. An open window brings in not only the sounds of a summer night, but perhaps the only chance of a cool breeze in hot weather. May end with a verse from the Bible which portrays darkness in a positive way, addressing God:

"... The sun knows it's going down. You made darkness and it is night: Wherein all the beasts of the forest creep forth." (Psalm 104 v. 19-20).






