Why sharp bends on our local roads?

Have you ever wondered why we have so many acute right-angle turns on the major roads close to the village? As there are just as many in other places explanations are available, and together with past local maps showing footpaths, farm tracks and field boundaries we can understand the local ones. In fact four reasons have been identified that relate to four different locations, all of which go back to the days well before the roads were tarred in the early 1900s...

- The earliest tracks would have taken the most direct routes between towns and villages. However the Romans introduced an efficient network of rectangular fields with north/south/east/west boundaries. Farmers ploughing their fields in alignment with these boundaries would have compelled travellers who previously crossed diagonally to use the headlands and go into the corners. In the days when travellers used a horse and cart or walked it had little significance and a public highway evolved on this route. The sharp bend near Cobbs Farm is an example.
- The second reason relates to the use of fords to cross streams before any bridges were built. In winter when water levels were high, banks either side of a ford would become impassable. Travellers would then divert along the side of the stream to find another less used crossing. The left and right acute turns at Wash Bridge are examples of this.
- A third reason is associated with wealthy families that acquired farmhouses as rural retreats. Early maps show that many established routes once passed through farmyards and very close to the farmhouses where there was usually a watering hole. Once a prosperous family moved in they would not have wanted the traffic passing their door and re-directed it around the edge of their fields using acute turns. Those on the Lt Totham Rd close to Follyfaunts are examples of this.
- The fourth reason is associated with crossways on the numerous gravel tracks that once existed at a time when little track maintenance was undertaken. When the major routes were tarred many minor tracks were not, resulting in right-angle turns on those that were. Examples are the bend at Bakers Green and the bend close to Rectory Cottage on the Maldon Rd. (shown on the cover). The latter of which could well also be the remnants of crossway that passed by Follyfaunts farmhouse to reach Bakers Green and the Tothams, and a north/south route from the village to Church Rd. Tolleshunt Major.

Honouring those killed in the Great War recorded on our memorial.

This is being done by raising the Union Flag on the Church on the 100th anniversary of their death and ringing the bells for a short time during that day.

ERNEST ALBERT BELCHER

We have little in the way of details and family for Ernest except that he is recorded in the parish magazine for April 1917.

It says he died in hospital, at Brighton on Tuesday 6th March, after only five weeks of military training in the service of his Country. He left home on February 1st to join the Royal Field Artillery and soon contracted a serious illness, which proved to be fatal. He was aged 28 years. No details of the illness are given but such a quick death may have been due to a heart attack brought on by the sudden level of activity that soldiers are subject to when they join the army and start training This is only speculation of course and there are several other possibilities.

His name is recorded in the official records of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as Gunner number 207489 of the 4th Reserve Brigade of the Royal Field Artillery. He is buried in the churchyard of All Saints Little Totham. As an official casualty of the Great War from the joint parish of Goldhanger and Little Totham he was added to our war memorial in 2014.

Private 250196 ERNEST HENRY EVERETT, 5th Battalion Essex Regiment.

Ernest died on 26th March 1917 as a result of wounds received in the battle of Gaza. He was from Head Street and was one of three brothers all in the Essex Regiment who fought in the war, his brothers Bertie and Arthur survived.

Ernest fought in the lesser know theatre of the Great War against the German allies the Turks, The 5th Battalion Essex fought with the Egyptian Expeditionary Force in Palestine (now Israel) then part of the Turkish Empire and first entered that country in December 1916 and eventually took Jerusalem at the end of 1917. Ernest has no known grave but is commemorated on the Jerusalem Memorial in the Jerusalem War Cemetery which is situated a short distance outside the walled city at the north end of the Mount of Olives and our memorial in Goldhanger.





Some thoughts on the history of bell ringing

The sound of bells is deeply rooted in British culture. Almost everyone in Britain lives within hearing range of bells. They provide the grand soundtrack to our historic moments; ring out our celebrations and toll sadly in empathy with our grief.

The history of bells is a long one and I can only scratch the surface in a short article, but records show that bells were first mentioned in relation to churches and religion in 400 AD. They spread with the introduction of Christianity and their adoption was widespread by about 550. By 750 they were sufficiently common for the Archbishop of York to order all priests to toll their bell at certain times and by the late 10th century for St Dunstan the then Bishop of London and Archbishop of Canterbury, to make rules for their use.

During these early years, the founding or making of bells by the monks of the many abbeys became quite sophisticated and the basic technology we use today remains essentially unchanged.

To ring a large and heavy bell is not an easy thing to do. To begin with most churches had only one bell, they were hung on a spindle and were rung by pulling a lever attached to it. As many as 20 men were required to pull the lever of a large bell and they had to use a rope to enable them all to get at the lever. It was difficult to control and impossible to ring more than one bell with any kind of rhythm.

Over hundreds of years innovation slowly took place and quarter wheels, then half wheels were used to make control and ease of use better. In the 1600s whole wheels began to appear and this enabled the development of change ringing as we know it today, where a number of bells can be rung in sequences and make a pleasing and melodious sound.

This combination of the easier control using the whole wheel and the development of change ringing led to increased interest by lay people who began to take over belfries from the clergy and set up societies or companies of bell ringers.

The recreation began to flourish during the late 17th century and an important milestone in the development of change ringing was the publication in 1668 by Richard Duckworth and Fabian Stedman of a book, that laid down "plain and easie rules for ringing all sorts of Plain Changes." Stedman followed this up in 1677 with another famous early guide that introduced dozens of new methods including his Grandsire method and his Stedman's principle.

These books described the art of change ringing and drew up rules for long series of changes without the need for calls, whereby bells must change place at each pull of the rope creating patterns where they never sounded in the same order twice. These compositions were named methods and were often named after the cities they were first rung in such as Norwich, London or Cambridge.

To Stedman we owe the complex system of changes that makes a "peel". Because of this, he is called the father of modern bell ringing and his Grandsire method is still rung regularly in our tower.

In the late 1700s and early 1800s social unrest with the backdrop of the French Revolution, the upsurge of reformist activity and disenchantment with the ruling classes, including the church, meant some belfries became notorious as the meeting place of the village riff-raff who indulged in heavy drinking and riotous behaviour. The rift between bell ringers and clergy was extreme in many places and bell ringing fell into disrepute.

This was checked by the great Victorian reform of the Church of England when Rectors were reinstated in control of bell towers, despite many groups of ringers who fought to preserve their privileges. Church leaders set about improving the standard of ringing and ensured proper and reverent behaviour in the ringing chamber. They also encouraged ringers to attend church services. Many churches had the floor of the ringing chamber removed and the ropes lengthened so the ringers became an integral part of the services of worship.

In the late 19th Century, women began to take up bell ringing and Miss Alice White of Basingstoke was the first woman to complete a full peal in 1896. As more women became interested, the Ladies Guild of Change Ringers was formed in 1902.

There are many highlights mentioned in the accounts of bell ringing history since then but this date sets the essential pattern of bell ringing today.

This pattern can be seen in the history and information about bell ringing in Goldhanger.

In the 1400s a tower was added to our church containing one bell. In 1549 at the time of the Reformation when many bells were removed from abbeys and re-hung in churches, the records show we had three bells and a smaller Sanctus bell, which would have been rung as part of the service to announce the elements of prayer, readings and communion. In 1657 we had 4 bells, two of which remain to this day.

They were made by Miles Graye a bell founder from Colchester and at this date they would most certainly have had full wheels and would have been rung successfully in simple patterns of changes.

Two of our bells are engraved with the date 1781 by which time we had five bells and were able to ring the methods devised by Stedman and we know our bells were upgraded to a peel of six in 1899.

This was due to the involvement of the Rector Frederick Gardner who began his ministry in 1893 and tasked his gardener John Buckingham to form a band and put the bell ringing on a proper footing, which he did. Interestingly John Buckingham lived and died in Rectory Cottage, the house I now live in so perhaps this had some influence on my becoming a bell ringer.

In 1951 the old oak frame was replaced by a steel one; our bells were refurbished and increased to a peel of eight, with a new bell coming from the redundant church of St Giles in Colchester. The eight Cwt tenor was recast and dedicated to the Revd. Frederick Gardner, who was Rector here from 1893 to 1936 and also his wife Ethel Mary. These bells are regarded as one of the best rings in a wide area around us and many visitors come to ring them.

Records from the reign of James II, show that from these times bell ringers have always been competitive and strived to outdo each other. On days of competition the ringing was often preceded by a large meal in the local pub and followed by the presentation of a good hat or a pair of gloves to each ringer in the band which performed the best.

Competition and visits to the pub are still a feature of today's ringing and Goldhanger plays its part. There are no hats now but two of the trophies presented by the Essex Association of Bell Ringers annually are named in memory of prominent Goldhanger ringers of the past. The Arthur Appleton and the Ernie Johnson trophies. We are still working to win these back.

Like most recreations of this nature the level of interest and competence goes up and down as time passes. We know that the generation before us were particularly skilled and regarded as such in the wider area. We are perhaps not as good as them now, but interest is high again, we are well led and improving quickly. It has taken over 100 years but Goldhanger is also at last in line with national history as we have eight women in our band of thirteen.

To prevent us fading away a light supper was enjoyed during the break, delicious pulled pork or roast chicken rolls along with vegetarian burgers, sage & onion stuffing and apple sauce. Whilst we chilled with a glass or two Kathryn and special guest Andrew Kelso performed a cello duet, stimulating our senses with a riot of strong deep rhythms.

It didn't take us long to get back into the swing, we jigged, reeled and swirled the night away, exchanging and passing on partners like they were yesterdays news but somehow always getting back to the one we started with.

It was Kathryn's idea to put on a Ceilidh for the village which has raised a fabulous £585 towards the Village Hall Improvement Project. Thanks go to Kathryn and her band, Elaine the caller, Andrew on cello and to the Village Hall committee members for their unwavering support.

A New Era at Lauriston Farm

Many of the readers of the Parish magazine will have visited Lauriston Farm either informally via the two footpaths or on a farm walk. Since 2004 I have developed the conservation orientated social farming business from scratch and over the last two years we have been developing plans for the future.

For this we have been receiving help and advice from an organisation called Funding Enlightened Agriculture which runs a funding program called Just Growth.

Our first step has been to form a strong and outward looking structure for the business. We chose the model of a *Charitable Community Benefit Society* as it fits perfectly with our work and future plans. It is



a wholly not-for-profit business and starts trading on April 6th this year.



We have written a five year business plan. It explains how we will build on thirteen years of conservation farming using biodynamic agriculture and rare breeds, education for all ages and life experiences for socially disadvantaged adults.

From this grows a new **Social Farming Initiative** which integrates adults with learning difficulties into all aspects of the farm business working alongside our staff and volunteers. As part of this our cattle herd expands, rare breed chickens and pigs are introduced, field scale vegetables are grown, educational work increases and a food-quality kitchen is built.

We have chosen to fund this expansion through the selling of *community shares* in our Charitable Community Benefit Society to create in Goldhanger the first community owned farm business in the catchment of the River Blackwater.

Each share costs £1 and when we have sold 15,000 shares, Just Growth will triple the £15,000 with a grant and a loan, both from ethical funders. We are looking to sell 20,000 shares which

will give a total funding pot of £60,000 which will fund the start-up of the Social

Farming Initiative.

The return on these shares is social and environmental with various other shareholder benefits on offer. Members can vote at the AGM on a one member one vote basis, regardless of the number of shares owned. The membership creates a body or warmth and support around our work which is invaluable.



Wildwatching News

A family visit to Padstow, North Cornwall, began in winter with blizzards and bitterly cold weather. However, it felt like spring by mid-week, with much milder weather, and snowdrops and even early daffodils much in evidence. Dunnocks were singing everywhere, from the garden of our accommodation to low shrubs along the Camel Estuary Trail. They are an unobtrusive but very cosmopolitan bird all across the UK and Europe. I've seen them right from the Rectory back garden here in Great Totham to the top of the Pyrenees on the French/Spanish border, and most of the habitats in between.

Some very photogenic Turnstones were easy to see around Padstow harbour, particularly at high tide but at other times as well. They were not only on the quays and moored boats, but on car parks and around shops as well. They seemed to be sharing with the Herring Gulls, Crows and Jackdaws the instinct to get food wherever it is to be found, and not sticking to their more traditional habitat on the estuary mudflats.



Walmsley Sanctuary, near to Wadebridge, had a pair of Spoonbills, (Pictured) present on the marshes. Spoonbills became more or less extinct in Britain in the early 1600's, but birds sometimes wintered in west-country marshes, and were found as spring visitors to parts of East Anglia. In the late 1990s there was a five-fold increase in the Dutch population of Spoonbills, which led to an "Overflowing" of birds to East Anglia, especially the RSPB Minsmere reserve. In 1998, a pair bred

successfully in Eastern England, for what was thought to be the first time in 330 years. Up to four pairs breed annually now, mainly in Norfolk - they turn up at Abberton from time to time.

"It's fun to roam, but there's no place like home," is one of my sayings. At the time of writing, there are Skylarks to be heard singing over the fields around here, and Yellowhammers singing in the Hedgerows. A Fox ran in front of the car after dark in Heybridge recently, and what I think was a Fox barking was heard from Great Totham Church, from the direction of Heybridge, on some nights.

A walk along Goldhanger Creek revealed that many wintering Brent Geese are still present, with a Reed Bunting, (Pictured), singing from undergrowth on the dyke. There



were five different species of waders, including Curlews, and here again, Turnstones. A number of Pintail drakes and ducks were present, associating with the more common Widgeon, which is often the case. Pintail are mainly a northern duck, but they breed irregularly at scattered sites throughout Britain and Ireland. As with the familiar Mallard, they are one of the "Dabbling," surface-feeding ducks.

Second Thursday's wildlife walks: The April one is on Maundy Thursday, 13th April. Meet as usual at Goldhanger church at 2.00pm, and we'll decide where to go then. All welcome.

<u>Planning</u> Councillors noted the following decision by Maldon District Council: Vaulty Manor Goldhanger Road Heybridge – Wedding gazebo within the enclosed garden of Vaulty Manor – **Approved.**

The following new planning application was considered:

Bluebell House 10 St Peters Close – various tree works. The Council supported this application.

The following decision by the Planning Inspectorate was noted:

Land to the rear of the development at the corner of Church Street and Maldon Road – proposed development of four five bedroom detached dwellings with garages and access road from new adjoining development. **Appeal allowed.**

Councillors received copies of the new Planning Toolkit which has been designed by Maldon District Council to guide parishes in their response to planning applications. It was felt that this would be a very useful publication.

Maldon District Council is holding a public consultation on documents relating to the Local Development Plan. These can be found on the Council's website and the consultation runs from 17th March to 28th April.

Play area and playing field

The sharp edges on the slide have now been removed. The old goal posts have been disposed of and the new ones will be put in shortly.

Highways

Proposals for the parking restrictions in Fish Street should now go ahead but no timescale has yet been given for the work.

Marigold Wood

Two dog waste bins have now been purchased and will be put in place in the wood shortly. It was noted that the public are now walking in the wood and access from the Village Hall should be completed shortly.

Members of the public are most welcome to attend and the agenda for both meetings will be published on the Parish Council's website and put on the notice board in the Square.

The Vicar/Rector writes:



Recipe of the month

Bacon, pea & basil macaroni

Serves 4. Preparation 10 mins. Cooking time 20 mins

INGREDIENTS

6 rashers streaky bacon, chopped

2 leeks, finely sliced into rings

1 tbsp vegetable oil

140g frozen peas

400g macaroni

200g pack soft cheese

85g mature cheddar, grated

1 tbsp English mustard small bunch basil, shredded



DIRECTIONS

Fry the bacon and leeks in the oil for 10 mins until the bacon is golden and the leeks soft. Tip in the peas and heat through.

Meanwhile, boil the pasta and heat the grill to high.

Reserve 150ml of the cooking water before you drain the pasta, then add the pasta, the soft cheese, half the grated cheese and the mustard to the pan with the veg.

Stir until the cheese melts into a creamy sauce. Stir in most of the basil and the pasta, then scatter with the rest of the cheese.

Grill for 2-3 mins until the cheese melts. Scatter with basil to serve.
