Shrimp Brand Beers at The Chequers

The Chequers has been owned by various breweries in the past and early postcards of the Square show a variety of brewery names on the inn. Two of those were "Shrimp Brand Beers" and "Russell's Gravesend brewery". These were trade names of the same brewery which was based at Gravesend in Kent, the result of Russell's taking over the Writtle Brewery Co. and its 90 Essex based pubs in 1900.

Russell's and Shrimp Brand beer was delivered into Essex by sea and estuaries using sailing barges. These barges were operated by just two men, so were a very economic form of transport.



Barges bearing the Shrimp Brand mark brought regular shipments of beer from Gravesend to a purpose-built Russells depot at the Fullbridge wharf. The beer was then taken around Essex by horse drawn drays and later on trucks with "Shrimp Brand" over the cab. The two man crew were given an allowance of beer for each trip to discourage them from "interfering" with the cargo.

This early 1900s photograph shows ten drays lined up outside the Fullbridge depot ready to make the day's deliveries and gives an indication of the scale of the local business at the time.



Russell's operated from 1858 to 1932 by which time it had 200 pubs in Kent and 90 in Essex. In 1932 they were taken over by London based Trumans Ales. Russell's built this impressive art-deco building in 1924 at Fullbridge, which sadly was burnt down in 2011...



Ministry Team Message

What does Advent mean to you?

"Advent??" I hear you cry. "But it's only November!" In the modern Church Advent starts on the fourth Sunday before Christmas, this year 29th November, it barely even makes it into November! If you go by the children's Advent Calendars you would think Advent started on 1st December, when they open the first door and these days munch on chocolate. (There was no chocolate in my day, not that I'm jealous of course!) But for me Advent starts on the evening of 15th November, because I follow Celtic Advent.

So again I ask you, what does Advent mean to you? Or perhaps I should ask what *did* it mean in a pre-Covid world? What did Advent look like for you last year?

Does Advent mean a flurry of shopping, buy, buy, buy – food, alcohol, presents? Fighting your way through the hordes and coming home exhausted? No social distancing last year! Does it mean wracking up a huge credit card bill and ignoring the implications until January? Does it mean putting up your Christmas decorations, buying a tree, ensuring the presents beneath it are in perfectly coordinated wrapping so as to complete the picture? For many of us it means working out who we're going to spend Christmas Day with and Boxing Day and New Year's Eve.

Then there's the work Christmas "do" and over excited children begging visits to Santa's Grotto. Perhaps a party or two? The race to submit annual leave requests before anyone else to ensure you get the time off that you want!

Hopefully, somewhere in all that bustle, excitement and stress, there might even be a church service thrown in for good measure. A precious hour to remind ourselves of the real reason for the season – the Carol Service, Christingle, Midnight Mass.

As a Priest, I would love to tell you that I spend Advent fasting and praying and generally being holy. Sadly I am a Priest in the 21st century and my Advent includes many of the things I have detailed above! That is precisely why I have adopted the practice of Celtic Advent.

In ancient Britain and Ireland the Celtic Christians observed three periods of forty days during the course of the year when they would fast, and especially devote themselves to deepening their relationship with God. The period we are more familiar with is Lent, the forty days leading up to

Easter, when traditionally people give something up as an act of penance. This would be followed by a further forty days beginning at Pentecost. Then the Celts would observe another forty days at Advent, which is why Celtic Advent begins on 15th November, forty days before Christmas Day.

By starting that bit earlier, I get at least a couple of weeks of "normal life" before the madness of December begins. I have more opportunity to pause, to reflect on what Christmas really means, to remind myself that we are in the run up to perhaps the most extraordinary event in history. The moment when God, - a being whom we cannot begin to imagine, whose very existence we struggle to grasp, - chose to come down to earth to live amongst us as a human being. Chose to experience life as we know it, with all it's difficulties it's emotions, it's trials and it's joys.

One of the things I find helpful during Advent is to read a devotional book. It helps to keep me focused and helps me to prepare for the coming of Jesus. If you would like to experience advent with the Celtic Christians, I would recommend a book called "Celtic Advent; 40 days of devotions to Christmas" by David Cole. Alternatively if you would like something which is not specifically Celtic in flavour then I would recommend "Watch For The Light; Readings for Advent and Christmas" which includes contributions from many well respected Christian writers, such as CS Lewis, Philip Yancey, Henri Nouwen, Thomas Merton, Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

I would also commend to you, not just for Advent but all through the year, an excellent website called <u>Godspacelight</u>, which has wonderful resources for the different seasons of the year including Advent and also offers a daily blog.

This year, who knows how much of our "normal" Christmas preparations and festivities will be possible, but perhaps we can fill the gaps with a little more prayer, a little more reflection and a little more time with God. I pray that God will bless you richly in the weeks to come.

When I lived in Hadleigh, Suffolk, 3 1/2 years ago, I joined a "Creative Writing" group through the U3A although some of the subjects chosen by the group leader, were "strange", it was fun rising to the challenge and seeing what the other members had come up with! Here is my interpretation of:

A Wet Sunday in November.

It's not so busy today – usually it would be packed in town this close to Christmas. Probably the weather has deterred folk, it's been pouring with rain all day, but it appears to be easing now and the sky is lighter. I remember when the shops were closed all day on Sundays, it was a family day, picnics in the country in summer and gathering round a roaring fire to watch an old black & white film in winter.

Nowadays, the "Family outing" is a big shop at Tesco's, followed by a burger & chips at McDonald's. How times change!

I'm cold and damp, huddled in a doorway in my sleeping bag. Some kind folk have brought me coffee and a sandwich, which was much appreciated. Most folk, however, look away, embarrassed, not knowing what to do or say! I wasn't always homeless. Not so long ago, I was hailed a hero, after serving in the army in Afghanistan. Seeing my mates blown to pieces, never knowing if the next few steps will be my turn, I was a broken man when I returned home to my wife and kids. They didn't recognise the person I had become, a nervous aggressive wreck, suffering from PTSD. My wife couldn't cope. I don't blame her, nor could I, so for the happiness of my kids I decided to leave them, even though I had nowhere to go.

So here I am, watching the crowds gradually assembling on the pavements. Thankfully, the sun has come out, and the "dignitaries" have descended from the Town Hall, the mayor looking resplendent in his robes and chain. There are many organisations here too, Scouts, Guides, WRVS, the Royal British Legion and The Salvation Army Band.

I think of some of my mates who couldn't adjust to the life after Helmund, and took their own lives, but not me, oh no! <u>not me</u>. In a few minutes I shall join all the many other folk, parading down the High Street, ex-servicemen and civilians, all remembering those who served, and died, for love of their country, and fellow men, on the remembrance Sunday, a wet Sunday in November.

Internet Broadband - Gigabit Connection Upgrade for Goldhanger - Update

We are please to advise that things are progressing with the Openreach updated proposal. In the interim, we felt that it would be helpful to clarify some misconceptions that have concerned a small number of villagers.

- Q "Will I have to pay for it?"
- A "No, the government vouchers are used to cover all of the cost, the scheme does not go ahead until that point."
- Q "Is it the same service that is being installed in some other villages where householders are being asked to pay huge sums of money?"
- A No, this is a different initiative, the government vouchers are used to cover all of the cost, the scheme does not go ahead until that point."
- Q "What if I do not wish to have an upgrade and am happy with the service that I already have?"
- A "Thats absolutely fine, you can continue as you are."
- Q "How is the service provided to my house?"
- A "Your existing telephone line is replaced with a new similar cable which contains copper wires and also fibre cores"
- Q "Will all the roads need to be dug up?"
- A "Openreach have advised that they will be able to use existing ducting and also overhead poles where available in most instances."
- Q "Do I have to transfer to Openreach for my broadband?"
- A "Openreach are not an internet service provider (ISP) and consequently they do not mind who you use. Openreach provide the cabling only."
- Q "Can I continue to use my existing service internet provider (ISP) if I transfer to the faster connection?"
- A "Generally you can, most (if not all) of the major ISP's can provide the new service"

As our parish magazine has over many years recorded various local activities and provides us with interesting archive stories, I thought my summer adventure might be interesting and a positive story in these weird Covid times, I also don't know if it's been done before.

A few years ago a fellow swimmer friend, who lived in the village at the time, said we should organise a swim 'around' Osea. At the time a few of us had started swimming across to Osea and back, a development from when a village group swam one way in 2010, it is just under a mile each way and this formed part of our triathlon training. Swimming across to Osea and back is in itself is a challenge and requires confidence, an understanding of the tides, conditions and experience, with an awareness of other river users. We've also swum to Maldon a few times with the incoming tide which is more hazardous (crossing the channel with other river users) but less technical.

Going round Osea needs planning, you want to get around to the West Point (Maldon side) just as the tide turns, so the outgoing tide brings you home, but that means crossing the channel to the East end as the tide is still coming in. The incoming tide will always drag you a bit towards Maldon so finding the right place to cross is important. I choose the gravel spit off the point at Lauristons (Gore saltings) which is directly across from the East point sand spit on Osea, so a bit of a gamble for getting across the channel, but the best option.

We picked a weekday, (mid July) so river traffic would be minimal, a morning tide, which also happened to be a neap tide.

I made an educated guess at how long it would take us (based on our abilities, tidal flow and distance) and decided we should start the swim 2 hours before high tide, we also had to take into account the half hour walk to get to our start.

On the day, conditions were perfect, it was warm (but a wet suit was still required) and very still.

After stuffing our flip flops in our swim buoys (for visibility) three of us (all ladies over 50) set of as planned.

We swam steadily, going over the oyster racks as the water got a bit deeper, most of the way across the bottom was visible, a few clear jellyfish, bobbed about, then at 1400m across it got really shallow (knee

deep) and we were still 300m from East point, the saltmarsh was to our right and we walked and swam to the sand spit, enjoying the strangeness of being in the middle of the Estuary.

The South side of Osea is a deeper channel than the Goldhanger side and this made the water cooler. My friends husband joined us in his kayak having set off from Tollesbury and we briefly paused for a drink which was stowed in the kayak.

We passed a pill box, the Manor House and Osea pier, where some visitors staying on Osea were also taking a swim, and more visitors, transported by CRS Marine, were being dropped of. We carried on to West Point. I thought this part of the swim would be quicker and we would have to wait on Osea road for the tide, but our timing was perfect and as we came around it was right on high tide and as we crossed from Osea road we got pulled sideways with the outgoing tide, which was stronger than expected, 'sighting' on the kayak helped as we could focus on swimming and not waste time sighting on the shore, which is quite disorienting from nearly a mile away, and easy to end up in the wrong place.

We reached the beach, next to the sailing club start hut, 2 1/2 hours and 4 miles after starting.

Our wetsuits had chaffed our necks, but this is often normal for a long swim and we pottered up the road in our wetsuits to go home (separately, for we are in the time of Covid) for a cuppa and plan to our next adventure.





GOLDHANGER PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the remote Ordinary Meeting held on 13.10.2020

Planning

It was noted that Maldon District Council has issued a Tree Preservation Order for an oak and a pine tree on land to the west of Thistley Close. This order will remain effective until confirmed or otherwise within 6 months of the date of issue (17.9.2020)

Councillors considered the following new planning application:

19 Blind Lane Goldhanger – Double garage with room in roof to the front of existing dwelling house. The application was supported.

There is still no information from Maldon District Council about ongoing enforcement issues. The government's white paper "Planning For the Future" sets out proposals for the alteration of the planning system. The Council will send its response shortly.

<u>Covid 19</u> Essex County Council is to ask the government if Essex can be moved into the new Tier 2 level of restrictions. If this is agreed it is intended to send leaflets to every household detailing what the restrictions actually mean.

Parking issues

An article has been placed in the village magazine concerning the difficulties with parking in the village.

Overgrown hedges

The hedge at the top end of Church Street with its junction with Maldon Road has now been cut back and the Parish Council appreciates the work carried out by the landowner.

Residents are reminded that it is their responsibility to cut back any hedge on their land if it impeded pedestrians or vehicles in any way.

Highways

It is very discouraging to report that there has still been no response from Essex County Council or Moat regarding flooding and drainage issues in the village.

Community Speed Watch. Although a pilot scheme has been run for other areas, Goldhanger has still not been notified of a date for training for its new group. The Parish Council will arrange for Trucam patrols to be held in the village to deal with speeding motorists.

The Speed Indicator Device in Maldon Road is again up and running with a new battery installed.

The landowner has been asked to cut back the hedge in Blind Lane opposite to the houses but this has not yet been done.

A pothole in Maldon Road near to its junction with Head Street will be reported to Highways.

Village sign

The village sign is undergoing repairs by Bakers of Danbury.

Dog fouling



Recipe of the month

Easy Lentil Curry

Less than 20 minutes to make and easy to eat round a bonfire!

Serves 2

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 spring onion, sliced

2 garlic cloves, chopped

½ teaspoon turmeric powder

½ teaspoon cumin seeds

½ teaspoon mild curry powder

2 green cardamom pods

1 tablespoon tomato purée

100g canned lentils, rinsed and drained

50ml hot vegetable stock

50ml double cream

salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 hot ready-made chapatis



Heat the olive oil in a frying pan over a medium heat. Add the onions and garlic and fry for two minutes, until soft.

Add the spices and cook through for two more minutes.

Add the tomato purée, lentils, and vegetable stock. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat to simmer for five minutes.

Add the cream and season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

To serve, pour the lentil curry into a warm bowl with the warm chapattis served on a plate alongside.


