Early telephones in the village

With fibre-optic cables about to replace the old copper wires for internet and phone use, now is perhaps a good time to look back to when it all began. This month's front cover shows an early 1900s postcard scene of Church St looking towards the Cricketers Inn. Opposite are the blacksmiths and probably the earliest village post office with a small manual telephone exchange. A telephone pole can be seen that has at most four lines on it.

A clue to when telephones came to the area is in Dr. Salter's published diary. He was the D'arcy and Goldhanger GP between 1864 and 1932 and lived at D'arcy. He recorded: "Nov 1872 - Telegraph wires installed in D'arcy", a surprisingly early date for this rural location, but he was an influential man. Only those in public positions, in business, farmers and the wealthy would have had a phone in those early days and Dr. Salter would have been one of the first.

Before automatic telephone exchanges appeared to enable number dialling, it was necessary to speak to an operator and ask to be connected. In rural locations in the early days this was done by through the local postmaster. This is what the equipment looked like...

GPO insulators

Amazingly there are still a few of the ceramic insulators (now collectables) here on some of the older buildings. "Twisted-pair" cables didn't exist in the early

days, so each phone needed two wires with two insulators at each end, so as the number of phones grew the poles became increasingly cluttered and these can be seen on some old postcards. This scene from a postcard is of the Church St. Filling Station in the 1950s...

Earlier, at the turn of the century, there were very few phones in Goldhanger so they all had low numbers, initially in the range of 1-99 and then 201-



299. Today about 20 premises still have their original numbers, now in the range of 788201 upwards. Most notable the Chequers has 788203 and a local farm has 788205. The Curate was 212, the Rector was 214 and a shop in The Square was 230 and so on.

David Cole

On Monday the 15th of February David Cole was laid to rest alongside his wife Hilary in St Peters churchyard. The Cole family owned Osea Island between the 1960s and 2004.

David and his brother Michael built up the electronics company called Cambridge Instruments Ltd. which designed and manufactured very high quality laboratory electronic instruments in the 1960s. They produced devices such as oscilloscopes, oscillators, pulse generators, etc. which were sold around the world. They were also accredited with working with Cambridge University to design, manufacture and market the world's first electron microscope.

The brothers also founded in Cambridge a separate company called Metals Research Ltd. which was the first to grow silicon crystals on a commercial scale, which were the basis of transistors and which became the foundation of all of today's digital technology.

Between the 70s to the 90s the family owned a light plane and flew to and from Cambridge to Osea Island at the weekends, frequently passing over Goldhanger. They sold the Island in 2004.

David's brother died in 2008 and there is an impressive entry about him in the Oxford Dictionary of National Biography and there was a long article about their business activities in the Daily Telegraph on 22-May-2008.





An Easter message from Revd Tracey Caswell

I'd like to tell you a story.....

I t was late one night, in the middle of Winter. A farmer, about to turn in for the night, looked out of the window of his cosy farmhouse. Snow lay thick on the ground and more was falling. The wind howled around the farm buildings, swirling the snow into a furious dance. The light from the window spilled out onto the scene, making the snowflakes flicker as they fell, turning the farmyard into a glittering white carpet.

A cold draught creeping round the edge of the window pane made him shiver. A log crackled on the fire and he was grateful for its warmth. "It's a cold night out there boy" he said to the old sheepdog stretched out on the hearth rug. The dog thumped his tail in response and yawned.

The farmer was about to close the curtains and head off to bed, when something caught his eye. A silhouette, rather like a furry caterpillar, stretched out along the branch of a tree. What on earth is that? he thought. As he strained his eyes to make out what the shape could be, he noticed it move slightly, wriggle and he realised it was a row of tiny sparrows, huddled together in a long line, with their heads tucked under their wings, and their feathers fluffed up in a vain attempt to keep warm. Every so often one would shudder and shift as a gust of wind ruffled its feathers or the snow started to build up on it's back.

Poor little things thought the farmer. They must be frozen. It's a wonder they're still alive. If they stay there, they'll be dead by the morning. Filled with compassion for these small helpless creatures, the farmer wondered what he could do to help them.

He began to mull over different possibilities in his head. I suppose I could put some food down, but I guess they won't come down to eat in the dark and it's snowing so hard it will have covered it within five minutes. I could put a tarpaulin up over the branch, but they won't stay there while I do that, and even if they come back it will probably flap around in this wind and scare them off again.

Then the farmer had a bright idea – if I open the door of the barn they might fly in there and roost in the rafters. So he put on his coat and his boots and picked up a torch and went out into the night to open the barn door. He hooked the door back and returned to the house where he watched from the kitchen door. Nothing happened. The farmer waited and waited, but the snow kept falling and the birds stayed huddled on the branch.

So the farmer tried to think of another way. I know, I'll put some food in the barn and maybe leave a trail across the snow. If I put the light on in the barn, they'll be able to see it. So out he went into the cold and the wind and the swirling snow and he switched on the light, scattered some handfuls of grain on the barn floor and walked towards the tree dropping a trail behind him. The sparrows looked up uncertainly as they heard him crunching across the snow towards them, but when he stopped and turned towards the farmhouse, they judged that the danger had passed and they tucked their heads back under their wings.

This is ridiculous, thought the farmer. They're going to die. Maybe if I creep up behind them and wave my arms I might be able to shoosh them in the right direction. If one goes in and finds the food the others will follow. It's a long shot, but there's just a chance.

The farmer crept round behind the birds, trying to walk as quietly as possible, he got quite close, but as soon as he raised his arms above his head the birds flew off.

The farmer's compassion for the sparrows and his frustration at not being able to help them boiled over into anger. He started to shout at the birds "What's the matter with you, you stupid birds? Don't you know you're going to die? I want to help you, why won't you let me?

At the sound of his shouts a couple of birds flew into the barn. "That's it, yes, stay there, you'll be safe" cried the farmer overjoyed.....but then the birds flew out again and went back to sit on the branch.

The farmer hid his face in his hands and wept. He wept tears of frustration and tears of sadness. He realised there was nothing more he could do. If only I could become a sparrow, just for a day, then I could show them the way to life he thought. But I can't and by tomorrow they'll all be dead.

This story is a good analogy for the story of God's love throughout the Bible. Right from the start in the Garden of Eden God loves the people he has created. All he wants is to have a relationship with them. He wants to care for them, keep them safe, and dwell with them in harmony. He wants to welcome them into his kingdom. But try as he might he cannot get through to them.

Through the whole of the Old Testament we see God reaching out to his people and his people turning away –deliberately avoiding him, misunderstanding him, not doing what he asks them to do, flying off in fear like the birds in the story. God tries everything he can think of to bring the people back into his loving arms, but every plan he lays fails. Some do follow him, but then they fall away again. Returning to their old life like the birds returning to their branch. Sometimes it seems as if God has finally found a way to get through to them – he raises up great leaders like Moses and David, he sends prophets like Elijah and Isaiah, but nothing really works. Leaders let him down, the words of the prophets fall on deaf ears. The people continue to go their own way and do their own thing.

So finally, God realises that there is only one thing left that he can do and that is to come down to earth himself. To become human, to live as a human, and to speak directly into people's lives. So he comes in the person of his son, Jesus.

As Saint Paul told the Colossian Christians "For in him, (that is Jesus), all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross."

By coming in human form, though he was divine, Jesus lived as one of us, he experienced life as one of us, he became a "sparrow" for our sakes, experiencing for himself all the joy and pain of life. He showed us the way from death to life. Just as the farmer holds open the door of the barn, Jesus holds open the door to eternity.

GOLDHANGER PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the remote Ordinary Meeting held on 10.3.2021

Planning

There were no decisions by Maldon District Council.

New application:

Three Thistles Thistley Close. T1 Oak - reduce portion of crown by 2.5m. Reduce remainder of crown by 2m. Remove lowest limb on northern side. T2 Leylandii – reduce canopy by 2m. This application was supported but the Parish Council queried whether it was too late to begin this work due to the bird nesting season.

Maldon District Council is investigating an enforcement issue at 1 Benham Close where it appears that the garage has been converted to another use and a new building has been erected without planning permission.

Maldon District Heritage Assets

This scheme means that if any planning application comes up on a heritage asset it would need to be considered in the planning process. This is ongoing.

A resident raised concerns that recycling bins and boxes are wrongly delivered to his address. The matter was raised with Maldon District Council and it appears that the recycling contractors are responsible for these errors. It is hoped that the situation will now be resolved.

Playing field and play area

The new slide and springers for the play area have been ordered but the recent adverse weather may delay their installation. However, the slide has been paid for as the Parish Council now needs to claim the grant of £2,000 from Essex County Council's Locality Fund.

The Parish Council has agreed that a new notice board for the English Coastal Path can be erected at the bottom of the steps from the path from Fish Street to the sea wall. The Environment

Agency did not agree to the suggestion that the board should be placed on top of the sea wall.

The Environment Agency has again advised that it is not responsible for putting up a new handrail on the steps up to the sea wall at the end of the playing field. The Parish Council will continue to look into this.

It was agreed that new gates should be purchased for the entrance into the playing field and into Marigold Wood.

The Parish Council discussed adopting a policy restricting the use of drones in the playing field, but it was decided that this should not be done at present. Advice will be sought from the Essex Association of Local Councils as to how this issue should be dealt with.

Highways

A damaged footpath fingerpost in Blind Lane has now been reinstated.

The Council continues to investigate with the Environment Agency exactly who is responsible for clearing vegetation from Wash Brook. The EA has stated that it is not their responsibility, but a landowner has advised that this work has in the past been carried out by the EA as the brook is classified as a main river.

Essex County Council has recently been very active in the village and jetted the drains in various locations to try and establish the cause of recent flooding. Various obstructions were found and investigations continue. Councillor Mr Sargeant was thanked for his work in getting things moving to find a solution to the problem.

The Council is looking into measures for speed and parking enforcement in the village for the next year.

Marigold Wood.

The work on thinning the trees has now been completed and villagers have been able to collect the resulting firewood.

Village pump.

The Council has now agreed that further repairs should be carried out so that the pump can be returned to full working order.

Dog waste

Unfortunately this remains a problem around the village and dog owners are reminded that they can be fined for not clearing up after their pets.

Blind Lane

A group of residents from Tolleshunt Major have been carrying out litter picking in their village and have now extended their work to Blind Lane in Goldhanger. The Parish Council will thank them for their efforts.

Next meeting of the Parish Council

Government advice continues to be that face to face meetings should not be held for the near future. The next remote meeting of the Parish Council will therefore be held on <u>Wednesday 14th</u> <u>April 2021 at 7.00 pm</u>, followed by the <u>Annual Village Assembly</u> at 8.00 pm. Interested residents are welcome to participate - for joining instructions please see the agenda which will be posted on the website (parish-council.goldhanger.org.uk/) nearer to the date.

Recipe of the month

Hot Cross Bread & Lemon Pudding

Easy peasy

Serves 4

Ingredients

knob of butter, for the dish 4 stale hot cross buns 200g lemon curd 2 large eggs 200ml double cream 200ml milk 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 4 tablespoons caster sugar little lemon zest




cream or vanilla ice cream , to serve (optional)


Method

- 1) Butter a 1-litre baking dish that will quite snugly fit the buns. Cut each bun into 3 slices, and sandwich back together with a generous spreading of curd. Arrange buns in the dish.
- 2) Whisk egg, cream, milk and remaining curd, then sieve into a jug with the vanilla and 3 tbsp of the sugar. Pour over the buns and stand at room temperature for 30 mins for the custard to soak in.
- 3) Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/ gas 3. Scatter the remaining sugar and lemon zest over the pudding. Bake for 30-40 mins until the top is golden and the custard gently set. Stand for 5 mins, then serve with cream or vanilla ice cream, if you like.

You could probably use fresh buns but reduce the liquid and soaking time to match.





Information on Goldhanger Neighbourhood Watch

You may have read or heard of NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH schemes but are still not sure what they are or whether you would like to be involved in one. It is worth stressing that is **not** a vigilante organisation and that participation is passive. Members are encouraged to act as the *eyes and ears* of the community. However, it is the job of the police to patrol the streets and *NOT* Neighbourhood Watch members.

What is Neighbourhood Watch? The aims of a NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH GROUP are as follows:

- It's a free, confidential service and it is up to you how involved you want to be
- To reduce opportunities for crime by deterring would be thieves and vandals
- To establish a community spirit so that everyone can contribute to the property by mutual co-operation
- To inform the Police of any suspicious activity
- To make members more aware of local crime problems and be more security conscious about their homes and property
- To encourage neighbourliness

What's in it for me?

- 1. Many home contents insurance companies offer a discount to the members of registered Neighbourhood Watch groups
- 2. Property prices can rise in areas where and area has little or no crime
- 3. Crimes against property can be reduced
- 4. A better community spirit can be created
- 5. Neighbourhood Watch groups have frequent contact with their local policing teams
- 6. Information and crime alerts can be quickly circulated to Neighbourhood Watch groups thus raising awareness and the opportunity to prevent crime and from members from being victims of crime
- 7. You don't have to be actively involved to participate. Many members simply register their email addresses with us so that they can receive crime alerts and crime prevention advice via their computers in their own homes. Registered e-mail addresses are held securely and NEVER divulged to outside agencies etc.

In short, forming a Neighbourhood Watch group will lead to a greater shared awareness of local problems and a better understanding of practical steps that can be taken to tackle them. If you want to know more, contact
